



### Subject Pronoun

The subject and completes the predicate (main action).

### Object Pronoun

The pronoun is a direct or indirect object. It receives the action, directly or indirectly.

### Possessive Adjective

Show ownership for a noun.

### Possessive Pronoun

Shows who or what owns, or currently has, something.

### Reflexive Pronoun

Directs the action back to the subject. Ends in -self or -selves

## Pronoun Chart

	Subject Pronouns	Object Pronouns	Possessive Adjectives	Possessive Pronouns	Reflexive Pronouns
1 <sup>st</sup> person	I	me	my	mine	myself
2 <sup>nd</sup> person	you	you	your	yours	yourself
3 <sup>rd</sup> person (male)	he	him	his	his	himself
3 <sup>rd</sup> person (female)	she	her	her	hers	herself
3 <sup>rd</sup> person	it	it	its	(not used)	itself
1 <sup>st</sup> person (plural)	we	us	our	ours	ourselves
2 <sup>nd</sup> person (plural)	you	you	your	yours	yourselves
3 <sup>rd</sup> person (plural)	they	them	their	theirs	themselves

### Did you know?

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**REFLEXIVE PRONOUNS** are objects that refer to the **subject**.

They end in -self or -selves.

The **boy** kicked **HIMSELF**. *HIMSELF = direct object*

**She** made **HERSELF** coffee. *HERSELF = indirect object*

**You** should address the letter to **YOURSELF**. *YOURSELF = object of the preposition*

**An indefinite pronoun does not refer to any specific person, thing or amount. It is vague and "not definite". Some typical indefinite pronouns are:**
