

Putnam.

January 3, 1921 - began flying lessons Neta Snook.



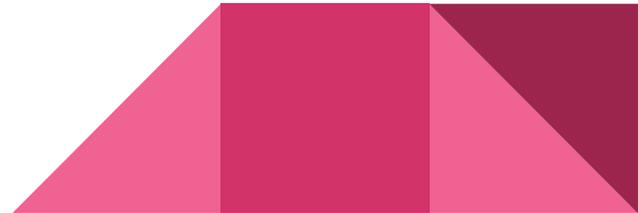
July 1921- bought her first plane, the Kinner Airster (name "The Canary")

June 17-18, 1928 – First woman to fly across the Atlantic; in 20 hours 40 minutes.
