Positive behavior choices will be recognized and rewarded.




Dear Students, Parents, and Guardians,

- 5. Use technology in a responsible and safe manner
 - a. Practice keyboarding (typing) skills
 - b. Learn multiple computer applications
- 6. Master appropriate social and organizational skills to be successful in the school setting





Parent/Guardian Volunteers

Homework

Homework has three required parts:

- 1. Read daily for 20+ minutes with an adult or older sibling and record readings on the Weekly Reading Log.
 - Complete online Accelerated Reader (AR) quizzes on all stories and books read.
- 2. Study the multiplication facts, 1 to 10. All the facts must be memorized before Christmas.
- 3. Practice and memorize the weekly Spelling words. Spelling quizzes will be held on most Thursdays.

The students are strongly ENCOURAGED to complete one or more online i-Ready math and reading lessons daily.


- The students will earn extra credit for completing i-Ready lessons.
- Visit the class website (math class), wolfpups.org, for directions on how to complete the i-Ready lessons.


Throughout the year, I'll offer OPTIONAL homework and learning opportunities via the class website.

• The students will earn extra credit for completing optional assignments.

Homework Folders

I will provide colorful homework folders for every student. I'll send home the folders, usually on Friday, with materials for the upcoming week, graded assignments, and important handouts. Please review the folder contents with your child. Please submit the weekly Reading Log, corrected assignments/assessments, and all other paperwork in the homework folder **every Friday**. Please return the attached gold-colored forms by Monday.









Math

The students will focus on mastering the multiplication facts. They will solve multiplication and division problems. They will understand place value. They will learn how to tell time, understand fractions, and measure using both the standard (imperial) and metric system. They will work with graphs, geometric shapes, and categorize objects. i-Ready places a heavy emphasis on word problems. The students are STRONLY ENCOURAGED to regularly complete i-Ready (My Path) lessons. Your child's growth in math is directly related to how often he or she practices math.

Math Tutorial

In recognition that math can be one of the most challenging topics for many students, math tutorial will be held every Thursday morning from 8:30 to 9:15 in the classroom. Students who eat breakfast at school will be dismissed at 9 AM. Please complete the Math Tutorial Club form to participate.

Reading


I will combine the new <u>into Reading</u> curriculum with novels, magazines, short stories, digital content, and other reading materials. The students will practice their fluency and comprehension skills. I will read and lead discussions on novels and the students will regularly read in small groups. The students will learn about genres, character development, themes, main ideas, supporting details, plot, sequence, literary terms, and figurative language. The students will be Reading Buddies with Mrs. Pilon's Kindergarten class on Wednesdays, 3:10-3:40.




Accelerated Reader is an online program that encourages the students to read and assesses their comprehension. The students will complete quizzes on the stories they read. They should use their books to answer the questions. Parents/guardians are encouraged to read and discuss the questions and answers aloud with their children.


Writing

The students will participate in a wide variety of writing tasks throughout the year, from weekly journals to creative stories. The students will write across all the subjects. They will complete short research projects, learn how to take notes, and use multiple writing applications (e.g. Google Docs and Slides). They will regularly practice their typing skills. They will learn how to work in small groups and make presentations. Strong emphasis will be placed on high frequency spelling words, grammar basics, and legible penmanship. We will NOT study cursive writing.









Science

The students will learn about forces in nature, weather, motion, electric and magnetic interactions, the life cycle, inherited traits, adaptations, ecosystems, and the interaction between organisms and their environment. They will engage in a wide range of fun science experiments, with an emphasis on Alaska. The students are encouraged to participate in Woodriver's Science Fair. Projects are due February 29th.

Social Studies

The students will learn about the history of Alaska and Alaskan Natives. They will learn about geography and use multiple reference resources. They will learn about social structures and citizenship.

Art

We will have a variety of art lessons throughout the year, both as a single subject and as part of other subjects. Grading will be based on effort and meeting the minimum requirements.

Specials

The students will receive music, P.E, and library instruction every week. The students need to consistently complete their homework in their Specials. They will receive grades in music and P.E. The school counselor, Mrs. Brashear, will provide weekly Life Skill lessons. Please contact the appropriate Specials teacher if you have questions about your child's performance in his or her class. Please ensure your child regularly completes his or her P.E. Fitness Log.

Pull Outs

Woodriver offers a rich variety of pull-out opportunities for the students. These include special education, speech, counseling, and ELP. All students will be assessed for ELP (Extended Learning Program).

Grades

Class grades are based on the following categories:

- 1. Homework and classroom work
 - Students will receive a score of 0 to 3 points on regular assignments and weekly participation. 0= missing, 1= incomplete, 2= complete but not corrected, 3= complete and student corrected
 - Participation scores are based on paying attention, completing assignments, and effort.
 - Students that complete i-Ready assignments will receive extra credit in their participation grades.
- 2. Quizzes, tests, and other assessments (open notes, except for Spelling and Multiplication Timed Quizzes)
 - I will grade quizzes, tests, and other assessments using percentage scores.
- 3. Projects
 - Projects will be limited in scope. Only optional "Challenge" projects will be completed at home.
 - The primary optional project is to participate in Woodriver's Science Fair (during the 3rd quarter).
- 4. Revisions and extra credit
 - The students may correct EVERY graded assignment and assessment for extra credit.
 - The students are encouraged to correct their assignments and assessments to earn half credit (e.g. a 60% would become an 80% if the student successfully corrected every problem). Please submit revisions within one week from the original due date.

Please regularly check PowerSchool (https://premier.k12northstar.org/public/home.html) and contact Mr. Kinder if you notice any discrepancies. Students should never throw away assignments until he or she verifies that the scores have been recorded in PowerSchool; in addition, the students are encouraged to keep their assignments to review for tests. Almost all quizzes and tests, except Spelling and multiplication quizzes, are open notes.

The number one reason students fail is missing and/or incomplete work.









Differentiation and Personalized Learning

Please let me know if your child has an IEP, 504, behavior plan, ELP, or any other special needs. I will actively strive to offer a variety of alternative assignments and assessments to best meet the individual needs of each student. Throughout the year, I will personalize assignments, projects, and assessments. I will simplify and modify assignments for students that need academic support, and I will provide higher order thinking and real-world application "Challenge" assignments for students that have already mastered specific content areas. I will never assign extra work, rather students will have the opportunity to complete personalized alternative assignments.

Behavior

I strive to foster a fun, relaxed, supportive, and respectful learning environment. I employ a variety of positive incentives to recognize exemplary behavior choices (e.g. individual stamp cards, small group stars, whole class marbles, class parties, and Fun Fridays). I regularly employ humor to engage the students. I endeavor to connect the curriculum to the students' interests. In general, my students are extremely well-behaved, and it is very rare that I need to contact parents or the office for support. When a child misbehaves, I try to understand the cause of their behavior and I work with the student, and parents/guardians (as needed), to develop a successful intervention. I welcome parent/guardian insights and recommendations. Please don't hesitate to contact me if you have any questions or if your child's home life has had any significant changes that may impact his or her behavior.


Field Trips


Wacky Wednesdays

To recognize and reward positive behavior choices the students will participate in Fun Friday activities, 3 to 3:40 PM. The other third grade class, Mrs. Rodgers, may join our class for select activities. To participate in Fun Friday the students must pass all their classes and exhibit good behavior throughout the week. Students who did not earn Fun Friday will complete schoolwork. Fun Fridays include a wide range of crafts, games, sports, and goofy activities.

Please contact Mr. Kinder if you do not want your child to participate in student birthdays and/or holiday events. I'm happy to schedule alternative activities. Families may donate cupcakes or other treats to the class on their child's birthday. Please provide store-bought treats with a list of the ingredients for students that have allergies. We will recognize and celebrate many national holidays and occasionally create art projects related to the holiday. As a public school, we will not discuss the religious significance of holidays.





The Ambassador may answer the class phone. The Ambassador also welcomes new students to our class and teaches new students our procedures.
